## Wolverines on Strike! University of Michigan Grad Students Demand Living Wage, Equity, and More in the Face of Mounting Repression

The Graduate Employee Organization (GEO) at University of Michigan has been on strike since March 29th. Among their demands are a living wage, harassment protections, gender-affirming healthcare for trans workers, a more equitable child care subsidy, and for the university to invest in community safety alternatives to policing.

Presented with such mild demands, the administration at U of M has engaged in shady, authoritarian tactics to bring the strike to heel. From further threatening the financial stability of grad students- cutting striking student's pay to a mere \$100 for the month of April- to deploying campus police to detain peaceful protesters, to trying to break the solidarity of grad student teachers and their pupils by arbitrarily holding student grades in limbo.

In the face of such strong-arm tactics the grad student workers have been met with gracious solidarity from other working people in Michigan. Auto workers, nurses, fellow students, and others have lent the financial and practical support the strikers need (truly, pizza provided in aim to feed strikers is much more savory than those delivered by the bosses to placate workers).

The Socialist Party of Michigan stands with GEO and the rise of the labor struggle and power it represents. We encourage everyone to donate to the GEO strike fund and support our comrades in Ann Arbor as they struggle for their rights and the rights of their community.


